Ground broken in Fayetteville for new MarketPlace Mall center

Mayor Bill Hurley predicted Tuesday at groundbreaking ceremonies for the new Fayetteville MarketPlace mall, "the new Fayetteville, the All-American Fayetteville, will soon be the home of the number one retail sales intersection in North Carolina; and if all other developments for this entire area occur, we just might have the most powerful business intersection in the South, right here at U.S. 401 and Morganton Road."

K.B.I. Properties, Inc. of Winston-Salem, and Combined America Properties of Dallas, Texas, are partners and developers of the \$15 million site.

Combined America, a Texas real estate organization, is the developer of many retail centers, malls, restaurant facilities and multi-family housing in North Carolina, Texas, California,

Arizona and Nevada. K.B.I., specialists in shopping centers and malls, planned and developed the very successful Winston-Salem MarketPlace.

Ed Easley, president of Combined America stated, "our intentions are to house a specialized group of retailers, a very selective mix of consumer value oriented operations in attractive, comfortable surroundings that will give consumers not only an enjoyable shopping experience, but a value related one."

"An attractive, colonial Williamsburg design will be carried throughout the 154,800 square foot mall, the interior will be totally climate-controlled and pedestrian traffic patterns have been strategically laid out to present consumers easy access to all stores from the mall center as well as its entrance locations," Easley

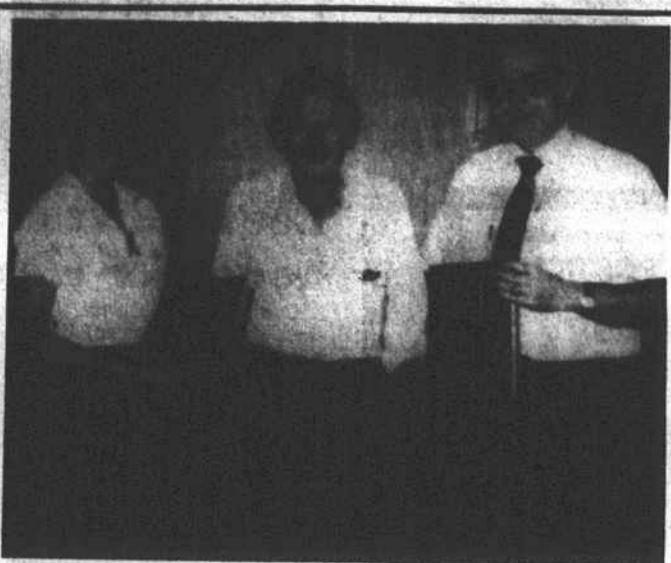

Hoke savings bond sales over \$40,000 for quarter

Sales of Series EE Savings Bonds in Hoke County during April-June of 1985 totalled \$40,692.

Total sales for the first six months amounted to \$75,069 according to Richard T. Jones, District Director, U.S. Savings Bonds Division.

April-June sales of U.S. Savings Bonds in North Carolina amounted to \$17,692,398, 34.4% above the \$13.1 million reported for the second quarter 1984.

January-June sales amounted to \$32,638,856, a 19.3% increase over the same period last year.

This represents 56.8% of the state's dollar goal of \$57,500,000.

Nationally, sales in the first six months of 1985 amounted to \$2.60 billion, a 23% increase over 1984.

U.S. Savings Bonds redemptions of \$3.05 billion for all series were 7% below the \$3.28 billion redeemed during the first six months of 1984 and the lowest for any January-June period since 1973. The total value of Savings Bonds held by the public increased

\$415 million in June, a total of \$76.69 billion.

Series EE Savings Bonds earn market-based rates if held at least five years from purchase date or November 1, 1982, whichever is later.
