# eer theft draws probation

A Shannon man was placed on two years of supervised probation in Hoke County District Court last week after he was convicted of walking out of a store with a case of beer he did not buy.

Ricky Chavis, arrested on August 20 on a warrant for larceny, was sentenced to a year in prison suspended for two years on supervised probation, a \$250 fine and \$14 restitution to be paid to Lake McNeill Beverage, court records say.

In other action, five cases involving drunk driving were heard in last week's court session.

Kenneth Lawrence Merwin, a Maxton resident, was sentenced to two years suspended for two years on supervised probation after being convicted of his third offense of driving while impaired (DWI),

records say. Merwin, 27, was ordered by the court to spend 14 days in jail and pay a \$600 fine.
