MONUMENTS—Jesse Caldwell

Deputy David Graham, D. L. Brown, Mrs. Brown and Boozie Do 20 Miles in 30 Minutes.

Salisbury, Nov. 14.—Paul Revere and his noted midnight ride must now take a back seat.

Paul's successor is young David Graham, a deputy in the office of Sheriff J. H. Krider of Rowan.

David's ride was made last night and it lasted about 30 minutes. In that time he covered the 20 miles between the Yadkin River toll bridge and Gold Hill and the ride was made under circumstances that were not conducive to peace of mind nor happy thoughts. It happened in this wise:

Sheriff Krider got information that an automobile load of whiskey was coming in from Virginia. He took several deputies out to the toll bridge, which is the edge of his jurisdiction, to meet the machine. They met it at 8 o'clock, but when the owner and driver of the machine, D. L. Brown, saw the officers he put his machine on high and pulled out for a race. Young Graham grabbed the machine and got up on the running board:

Mrs. Brown was in the front seat with her husband and the rear of the machine was full of what the sheriff had information about. So the officers had to stand up on the running board. Sheriff Krider, in his Ford (Brown's car was an Overland) took up the unspoken challenge for a race and he kept in sight of the larger cars for the 20 mile run.

When the machines passed through two principal streets of Salisbury they were neck and neck and were violating all known laws as to speed. The traffic squad of the local police force had its breath taken away. Some of the Saturday night shoppers who lined the streets saw the deputy swinging on the side of one of the cars with one hand while the other held a pistol and when several shots were fired from one of the cars interest in them and their occupants was increased.

Several machines took out after the racer and crowds stood around on the streets anxiously awaiting word from them. The shots fired in town were efforts of Sheriff Krider to puncture the tires of the larger car. Deputy Graham says he had difficulty in holding on and that his efforts to stay were not helped by Mr. Brown who seemed anxious to ditch him. Expostulations to Brown and even commands to halt fell on deaf ears. After riding 20 miles in his perilous position and being about to freeze Graham jumped from the machine.

Before Brown had gone 300 yards further his machine skidded and the rear wheels got in a ditch. Unable to get in the road he awaited the officers who came up in a few moments and he was placed under arrest. There was no charge against Mrs. Brown. In the machine the officers found 65 gallons of spirits, most of it in small bottles. Brown's bond was fixed at \$600 which he readily gave. He conducts a restaurant in Salisbury.
