Roads Ordered Built and Repaired.

At the meeting of the county commissioners on Tuesday of last week several new roads were ordered to be constructed and numerous highways ordered repaired throughout the county. Some of them are as follows:

Sand-clay road from Sunnyside school house by way of Jacob Kiser's to Bob Cole's place.

Sand-clay road from Alexas to a point on sand-clay road near old Hardin station.

Sand-clay road from the meadow road at Alonzo Rhyne's to connect with sand-clay road which runs south from High Shoals to Dallas.

Sand-clay road from John Reynold's place to a point near Milton Rudisill's on the Lincoln county line.

Several roads were ordered improved, among them the public road leading from Farnsworth's store to St. Mark's church to be opened up and repaired. It was ordered that a new survey be made of road from Frank Shuford's to the Cleveland county line that it be opened up and improved, ordered that road be opened up and improved from Sunnyside to a point to be fixed by survey, near Cleveland county line.

The resignation of B. P. Folk as county demonstrator was accepted and J. M. Gray was elected as his successor, the county paying him \$50 per month. The Federal government pays the other part of the demonstrator's salary.

Editor DePriest Starts Suit.

A special from Newton to The Charlotte Observer, dated Jan. 24 says, "Editor B. H. DePriest of The Shelby Aurora-Highlander today started a criminal action for alleged libel in the county court against Editor Lee B. Weathers of The Shelby Star on account of certain articles published in The Star some time since, in which Editor DePriest figured in large sense as the subject matter. The hearing will come up next Friday, and from the county court it is expected that the matter will go on to Superior Court."

"In addition to this criminal action there is also a proposed civil suit in which alleged damages will be asked on account of the publication mentioned. It may be that this action will also be heard in Catawba county. Mr. DePriest has retained W. A. Self of Hickory, who was here to day with his client in connection with the case, which is started in this county on the ground that the alleged libelous articles have had circulation in Catawba.

Whiskey the Cause of Local Tragedy.

Whiskey and a pistol were the principal causes of a tragedy which was enacted Saturday night about 9 o'clock on the Bessemer road just west of the city limits, as a result of which Russell Harvell, a young man about twenty years of age, lies at the point of death in the City Hospital, whither he was removed shortly after the shooting, and his assailant, George Patterson, is behind the bars at the county jail awaiting developments. Both were employed at the Gray Mill.

It has been difficult for the officers to obtain a very clear idea of how the shooting occurred. It seems that these young men were at a party in the neighborhood. Patterson was drinking heavily. Harvell and probably several others of his companions, some of whom it is thought were drinking also. Harvell and others were attempting to take Patterson home. They discovered a pistol in his pocket and removed it. When he discovered that his pistol was gone he became angered. After pleading for it and promising to behave, his companions returned the weapon to him and he at once turned and shot into the crowd, wounding Harvell, who it is stated, was a good friend of his.

John Quinn, mail carrier on R-2 brought to town last Monday a green snake nearly a yard long which he found on his route crawling on the frozen ground. First National Bank has Another Prosperous Year.

The annual stockholder's meeting of The First National Bank of Cherryville was held Tuesday afternoon Jan. 18th in the directors room of the bank. In spite of the inclement weather a good representation was present. The report submitted by the cashier showed the bank to be in most excellent condition, and the past year to be the most successful year in the bank's history. Deposits showed an increase over last year of over 50 per cent. During the year \$5,000.00 was paid out in cash dividends, \$2,300.00 passed to the undivided profit account, after charging off over \$600.00 for depreciation in Furniture and Fixtures, this being in keeping with the conservative policy of the bank to charge off a certain amount each year, so the strength of the bank is at all times more than their statements show.

All the directors were re-elected as follows; S. S. Mauney, M. L. Rudisill, N. B. Kendrick, L. L. Self, W. H. Houser, D. P. McClurd and M. L. Mauney of Cherryville, W. A. Mauney of Kings Mountain and Chas. C. Blanton of Shelby.
