DANVILLE WOMAN DIES FROM DRINKING POISON

Mrs. John H. Bouldin, Victim Of Poor Health, Takes Carbolic Acid.

HAIL STORM HITS PELHAM

Charlotte, March 28.—Mrs. John H. Bouldin, committing suicide at her home on Floyd street yesterday evening by swallowing most of the contents of a two-glass bottle of carbolic acid. She was found in her room suffering intense pain and the physician who was called found her condition such that it was necessary to remove her to the hospital where she died at 8:15 this morning after taking the acid.

Bouldin sold this morning that she had been in a state of bad health for some time and that domestic worries were paining her mind. Her husband, who was in Elizabethtown, N. C., was notified by wife and arrived home this morning. Bouldin was 48 years of age and a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Miller, who survive with two brothers and two sisters, all now deceased with the exception of a son.

H. E. Cox, a former of Durham last Friday killed what is believed to have been the largest hawk owl ever seen in that neighborhood. It measured four feet and ten inches over the wingspan its talons being as large as a man's hand. Cox found the owl in the fork of a tree just the male bird and wounded the female as they ran.

Mrs. Charlotte A. Vincent, widow of a son, died Saturday morning at the home of her daughter, Mrs. T. H. Hartman after a long illness. Death was due to a stroke of paralysis. Deceased was a native of Cleveland county but had lived here for some years past. Her daughter, Mrs. J. B. Vincent of Melrose, N. C., where interment will take place tomorrow.

An announcement was made here today of the engagement and approaching marriage of Miss Frances Lucy Black, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Black of E. J. Moore of this city. The wedding will take place here April 2. The prospective groom is a veteran of the world war and was wounded fighting with the Richmond Grays in the Argonne.

INFANT ABANDONED IN A MOST HEARTLESS WAY

Live Child Found In Knapsack Bag Morning But Signs Of Death Are Soon Discovered.
