At Raleigh last week during the meeting of the 8th Congressional delegates to the State Convention, J. F. Hendren was elected as one of the alternates to the National Democratic Convention to be held at San Francisco, June 28th. R. S. Graves, of Caswell, is another alternate. Both of these gentlemen are making their arrangements to attend the Convention.

The Tribune is trying to verify the street talk that options have been taken on several farms near Elkin for the purpose of raising monkeys. Real estate dealers interested refuse to give any information, stating that the deals are not yet closed. The public is interested in the industry and it is said that a corporation will be formed and the stock subscribed. Widowers are to be given opportunity to buy preferred stock.

The census reports give Winston-Salem a population of 48,325, which makes it the largest city in the State. Gastonia made the largest gains of any city in the State, having more than doubled her population in the past ten years. If Elkin had extended her corporate limits last year and taken in her suburbs, which are in reality a part of the town, her population would have been considerably more than doubled and her percentage of increase would have lead the state.

Bishop Joseph S. Key, of the Southern Methodist church, died at his home in Sherman, Texas, last week. When the church here was in the Statesville district about thirty-two years ago, Bishop Key presided over the District Conference which was held in the church on the hill where the graded school building now stands. On Sunday at 11 o'clock A. M., he preached to one of the largest congregations ever assembled here, people coming many miles to hear a Bishop preach. In the afternoon he held a baptismal service at which there were six children baptized, of these, three are living and three are quietly sleeping in Hollywood cemetery.

**Strikes.**

Strikes among the different labor organizations and professions throughout the length and breadth of the country seems to be the order of the day, and the worst part of it all is that they continue to grow and the demands of the strikers become more and more oppressive. More pay and less work is the general cry that we hear wherever a strike is called. We don't propose to attempt to give any solution as to the prime causes that lead to these unfortunate conditions, in the first place we are not capable of the task, and in the second it would do no good if we were.

The whole thing seems to center around capital against labor, or labor against capital, whichever way you wish to put it. Labor is demanding more pay for less work, while capital is claiming that it is paying more now than it can afford for what it gets in return. When God wrote the ten commandments' one of them was that "Six days shalt thou labor," now man wants to work only four and get pay for six. In any place in Holy writ it says that man shall obtain bread by the sweat of his face. How many are following those instructions? It means that we have gone far away from the old landmarks. The world is in a state of chaos, business is demoralized and everything seems disorganized. We have yet to see where anything has been gained through any of the strikes that have taken place within the past year. It is true that in most of them capital yielded to the demands of labor, but what was gained? Human lives were sacrificed, property was destroyed and immediate suffering and misery was the result. What will be the final outcome of conditions, only Him who raises the Universe can tell.
