

YADKIN CHURCH IS TO BE DEDICATED

Cost Above \$88,000 And is Splendid Building: Is of Brick Construction

Sandy Springs Baptist church, one of the oldest churches in Yadkin county, will soon be ready to hold its dedicatory service in celebration of the completion of a handsome new church building costing above \$88,000 in addition to the many gifts of time, money and material.

A steady growth, the membership now totaling 225, with a Sunday school enrollment of 250. This church was founded in 1840, and in 1885 a new church was built. The new building just completed replaces one constructed in 1908. This building is located near the Yadkin-Trade line, and its first pastor was Rev. J. W. May, who was elected pastor, and served for 37 years, or until his retirement from active work.

Carter was seen at Yadkin with him with an open knife.

Howard Southard Jailed for Attempted Attack on Little Girl 11 Years of Age

Yadkinville, April 10.—Howard Southard, 13-year-old white boy, was arrested here on a charge of attempted rape upon a 1-year-old white girl, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. M. Crismon, and in default of bond was locked in the Yadkin jail here to await the next term of criminal court. Southard is described as a boy of feeble mind. The attempted assault is said to have taken place in the little girl's room when she returned home from school. At the preliminary hearing held in court by Judge T. Johnson, of Hamptonville, Southard voluntarily related the story of the assault, apparently not realizing the seriousness of the crime with which he was charged.

Lumberton, April 18.—Seven girls from Samaritan state institution and a delinquent girl, who engaged in a riot in the Robeson county jail, where they were being held, were taken today to the Moore county jail in Carthage. They will be given trial at a term of Moore court beginning May 18 on a charge of burning two buildings at Samaritan. No demonstration was staged as they departed. Accompanying them in two automobiles were Sheriff C. J. McDonald, Jailer A. W. Lambert, Deputy Sheriff T. W. Slack and L. L. Marlon, all of Carthage. Nine other girls who took no part in the insurrection will remain confined here until their trial. Those going were Margaret Pridgeon, of Wilmington; Virginia Hayes, of Leaksville; Ruth Mercer, of Ayler; Joseph French, of New River; Deloris Sewell, of Cove City; Rosa Mull, of Rutherford and Wilma Owens, of Waynesville.

Holmes Lumber company, in Statesville, was totally destroyed this afternoon in a conflagration, which fanned by a rafter wind from the south, threatened that entire section of town. The roofs of several residences, 300 to 500 yards away, were set on fire by sparks that were carried by high winds. A number of small barns and outhouses near the fire were also consumed. J. C. Holmes, manager and principal owner of the lumber plant, estimates the loss, including building equipment, including building equipment, including material and lumber, at \$25,000 to \$35,000.
