President Urges Steps Be Taken To Give Work To Idle

Chicago, Sept. 22.-Mayors

His message was read to 8.0 municipal executives attending the United States conference of mayors just as they finished listening to charges that procrastination in distributing the public works funds had put national recovery in the doldrums.

"We are at the point now where he states and municipalities intersted in public work projects should ome forward quickly with propoals which will give immediate work to their unemployed", President's message said.

"We want to cooperate to the fullest possible extent, and I assure you that after your projects have een passed upon by the state adisory boards they will be acted upon in Washington with a minimum of delay.

"We will match speed with you. The money is available and we want to put men to work."

The president's message was lirect reply to the objections many mayors had brought to the conference against delays in distributing he funds for public works.
