Comer awarded contracts to 12 bus operators for the operation of 22 busses These 22 busses will cost the county total of \$1,821 a month, or about \$1,000 less than the rate the buss ontractors were paid for the term last year with two more months to run during the present term. Mr. Comer stated that the county has an excellent fleet of school busses, including those operated by the contractors.
