

SURRY BUS PROBLEM AT LAST SETTLED

Contracts For the Operation of 22 Busses Are Let

The organization of the county school transportation system was completed last week when County Superintendent John W. Comer awarded contracts to 12 bus operators for the operation of 22 busses. These 22 busses will cost the county a total of \$1,821 a month, or about \$,000 less than the rate the bus contractors were paid for the term last year with two more months to run during the present term.

Mr. Comer stated that the county has an excellent fleet of school busses, including those operated by the contractors. The county will operate 24 busses, last week receiving three new and three rebuilt machines from the state school commission, which amply takes care of the county's needs.

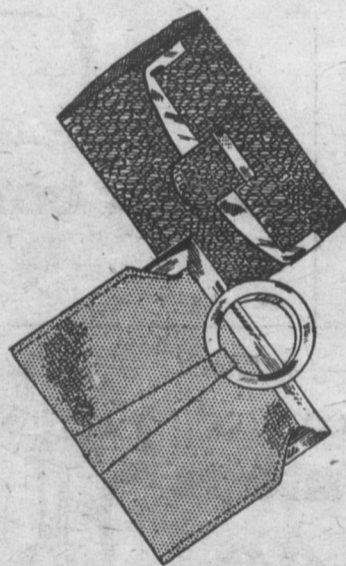
