John Arey, of State College will deliver an address at 11 a. m. on "Present Day Dairy Farming"; at 11:40 Mr. Jeter, agricultural extension editor, will talk on "Dairy Farming Under the AAA Program"; at 12:10 W. W. Fitzpatrick, milk marketing specialist for the Guernsey Cattle club will address the farmers on milk marketing; at 2 p. m. Professor Ruffner, of State College, will lecture on selecting an ideal milk cow, after which he will point out the major factors to be considered in making such a selection.

All four gentlemen are very able speakers and are expected to make the occasion one of much interest. Farmers are urged to make arrangements to be present for the meeting. The Shore herd of Guernseys will be well worth seeing. During the last few years his cows have taken many first prizes in the show ring for their fancy qualities as well as for their high production records.
