\$1,427,922 TO N. C.

Washington, Aug. 4.—Allotment of \$1,427,922 for soil erosion control in North Carolina as part of a \$27,400,000 national program was announced today by the government.

The money will be expended on five new projects and in continuation of existing projects. The new projects for North Carolina are in Alamance, Franklin, Rockingham, Mecklenburg and Davidson counties. Those which have already been started and will be continued are in Guilford, Randolph and Forsyth counties and in Union and Anson counties.
