

FUNERAL HELD MONDAY

The entire town of Elkin was ddened Sunday at the passing of Harrison Franklin Gray, almost eighty, the last of Elkin's pioneer settlers and one of the town's leading business men. Mr. Gray succumbed to a heart at-tack which he suffered only three hours before his passing about 12:30. He dressed as usual with his family when the end came. For several years Mr. Gray had suffered with a heart ailment

and five years ago he was forced to retire from active business. A native of Yadkin county, he

came to Elkin 69 years ago and during his residence here had been prominently identified with the industrial and business life of the town. He was an important stockholder in the Bank of Elkin, Elkin Furniture company, the Highland Orchards and other enterprises. He joined the Methodist church in early boyhood and was a valuable and active member of the church. Outstanding in the characteristics of Mr. Gray were his high sense of honor and integrity in his business dealings and his cheerful and friendly disposition.

He is survived by one son, Worth M. Gray, two daughters, Misses Jennie and Auba Gray and a niece, Mrs. L. G. Greene, of Statesville. His wife, Mrs. Mary Minnish Gray, preceded him in death eighteen years ago and another son, George Gray, for whom the local post of the Amer-


