At the close of the program the guests were invited into the dining room, where a prettily appointed collation, in which the Valentine motif predominated, was served buffet style.

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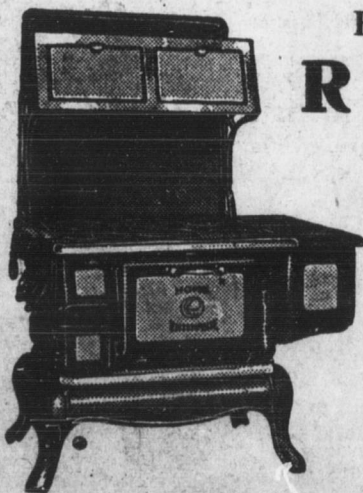
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
