Thousands of Madrid's "fifth olumn"—secret Franco sympathizers swarmed into the streets then and began taking over public utilities, communications and other vital centers.

Nationalist authorities followed the troops into the capital. They immediately assumed control municipal administration the One of their first acts was to free 18,000 political prisoners and nationalist sympathizers held in Madrid prisons.

As the troops entered, jubilant crowds thronged the streets. They gave the nationalist salute shouted, "arriba Espanal!" tionalist flags were flown every-
