

FIRST MOVIE IS SEEN AT 94

Ed Hemric, Civil War Veteran, Was Never in a Court House

GUEST OF THE RIPPLE

Yadkinville, April 5—(Special)—Ed Hemric, 94, saw his first moving picture here a few days ago as the guest of The Yadkin Ripple after he had related the fact to friends that he had never seen one. He states also that he has never been in a court house and has never heard a trial in court of any kind. Strikes us as being a stay-at-home man who attends to his own business.

Mr. Hemric went on a long trip one time, when he went to the Civil War for several months. He lost an eye by a Yankee bullet at the battle of Petersburg, Va., which he says was the largest battle of that war. He also has a scar on his left arm where another Yankee bullet went through his arm. But he came back to the war torn south and has helped to rebuild it by hard work, during which time he has reared six children and has 54 grandchildren and 47 great-grandchildren, all living. His wife died 10 years ago at 74.

Mr. Hemric was born at Swan Creek, Yadkin county. He now lives with his son, Harrison Hemric, near Yadkinville. He is a very spry man for his age and says he can dance a jig anytime he hears the music. He chews tobacco, smokes a pipe and admits he has taken his "dram" all his

life. He drinks strong coffee three times a day but has little use for milk or butter, he says. He states he is a strong Democrat and has been voting that ticket for over 70 years.

Mr. Hemric lived in Elkin a long time during which he worked in the old Elkin shoe factory for A. M. Smith for 18 years and worked in the Chatham mills for the late Hugh Chatham for 17 years. In the shoe factory he lost a finger.

Mr. Hemric amuses his friends by taking 40 yards of ribbon, placing it up his nose on one side and out the other and pulling it through. He also takes two matches, places one up each side of his nose, and rubs them together until they strike a light. He likes to play pranks on folks, and relates that one time when his girl friend jilted him to go with another boy to a party he sawed a footlog almost through, then hid in the bushes to see them fall into an icy creek when they started across.

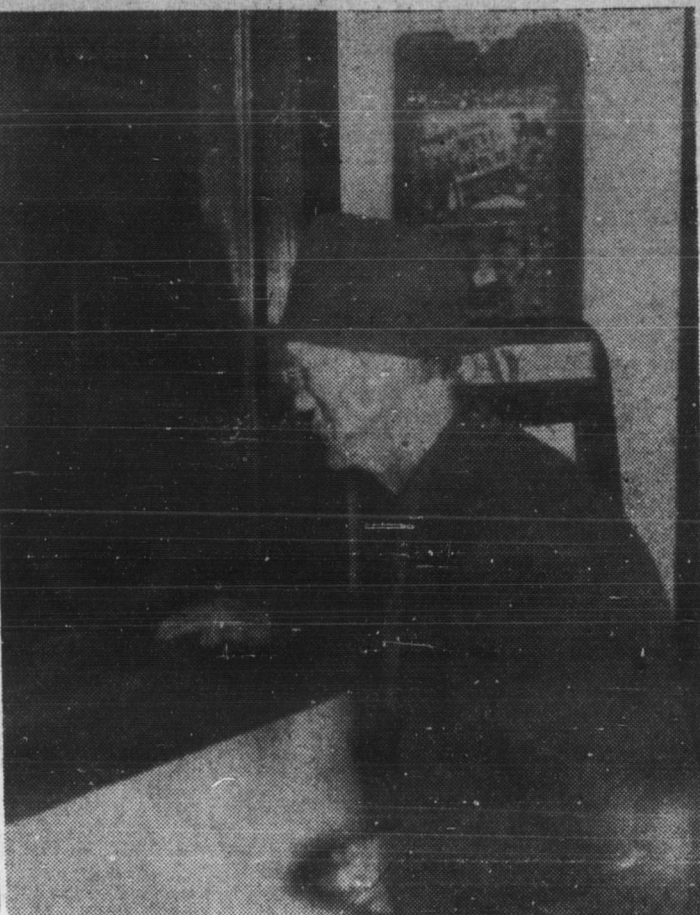

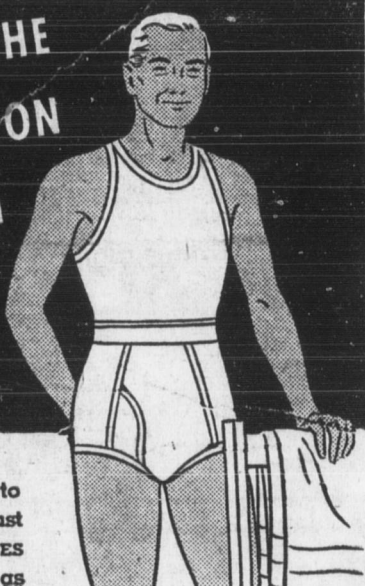
