### **Our Royal Visitors**

For the first time in history we have been privileged to welcome and entertain the King and Queen of England here on our own soil. It seems that we did a pretty good job of it, equalled only by the attention given the royal pair in Canada where there was more reason to pay homage.

There was no reason why they shouldn't come, and it was right and proper that we should give them the glad hand. The official heads of two great nations met in the White House, not to dicker or barter or perfect an "axis," but to indulge in a friendly social visit of a little more than ordinary significance. Both forgot for the moment what has been forgotten for a century, that the government of one was once the bitter enemy of the government of the other, and remembered only that the peoples of the two nations are now closer friends, in the real sense of the term, than are the people of any other two powers in the world today.

Nor should it be forgotten that it is a different kind of friendship than that which marks the Rome-Berlin axis. For Mr. Roosevelt and King George did not seek some secluded spot and discuss alliances or military understanding; didn't ponder when and where and how to strike next to gain individual or mutual advantage.

There have been times when the leaders of the two governments have clashed over world policies, but the relations of the peoples of the United States and Great Britain are rooted in common culture and civilized understanding so it has been easy to survive these clashes, and retain a mutual friendship through the years.

We like to think that in large measure that would be the case of other international relationships were it not for the selfishness and greed of their leaders who all too often misrepresent the hearts and purposes of their people. We know that the German masses are an industrious, efficient and much of the program of their leaders are not of their making and approval. Nor does one have to lay claim to wisdom to say that their friendship with Rome is not of the kind that we have been witnessing for the past few

King George and Queen Elizabeth, unfortunately didn't see us as we really are; they couldn't look beyond the waving hands and the armed guards to see America at work and at play. That is the price they must pay for their royal blood.

Wouldn't it have been fine if both could have donned the garb of the street, to take in the World's Fair, incognito? Both would have gotten a kick out of that.

### No Strings Tied to the Job

When the board of trustees named Dr. Ralph McDonald to the position of associate director of the extension division of the University of North Carolina, the announcement was accompanied by implied if not expressed assertion that the appointment was

## There Are Other Debts

If you are among those who cannot see anything to commend in President Roosevelt's program, maybe you'll agree that his wife sometimes gets off on the right foot. In her simple, direct way she often points out something worthy of the thought and consideration even of our statesmen.

The other day in Washington Mrs. Roosevelt told a Worker's Alliance conference that she is more concerned with social than with monetary debts affecting the na-tion's future, and urged a more intelligent use of the ballot to guide in such matters.

"There are some people who are talking about the piling up of debts our grandchildren must pay," she said. "I know other ways also in which we are piling up debts that our grandchildren must pay—underfed children.

We take it that Mrs. Roosevelt referred to "underfed children" merely as a symbol of all those responsibilities that we have been taking as a matter of course—and not to be shouldered: making it possible for everyone to earn his keep and in all segments of American life; proper educational facilities; decent health conditions; adequate care for the mental delinquents—all of which we have merely been making a stab at relieving, and all of which even now represent national deficits more important than the dollars we are all grumbling about.

Much of the spending for these things has been profligate and without studied Saturated with politics, in many instances it has failed in its objective. Yet these are debts that are cumulative and some day will have to be paid—with interest -just as our monetary obligations must be

met at the expense of all of us. We think Mrs. Roosevelt has something there.

### The Unseen Toll

That was a significant item briefed into the "Events of the Week" column in the last issue of this paper, which told that families in Surry county pay a total of \$93,210 annually in hidden taxes on food alone. It is important enough to be repeated and even enlarged upon.

The figures are those of the National Consumers Tax Commission and are computed from averages based on last available U. S. Census figures, and therefore are approximately correct. It is well to remember, then, when you go to stock your pantry, that these unseen levies, for example, take 11 per reasonable group of human beings, and cent. of butter costs; 6½ per cent. of bread there are abundant reasons to believe that costs, 10½ per cent. of sliced bacon and  $14\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. of the cost of coffee.

These hidden taxes would be better nam-"shifted" taxes, because they represent the various levies made against the procesors and handlers, practically all of which are passed on to the consumer, added to the purchase price which the consumer pays without knowing it.

Multiply this shifted tax as found in the purchase of food by that represented in every other sector affecting the family budget and you have a sizeable wad that is being wrung from the families of this and every other community in the land. And because it seems so painless it will continue until the grumbling of those who pay force these hidden taxes out in the open where they ought to be.

Read those figures again and weep: \$93,210 annually collected from the people of Surry county alone, and that is only the beginning. Those hidden taxes are buried in the cost of the shoes you wear, the coat on your back, even the line with which you guide old jar-head. And yet Governor Hoey tells you that "if it were not for the sales tax a large majority of the people of North Carolina wouldn't pay a cent in support of their government.

Mind you, there is no purpose here to claim that these taxes are not necessary, or even that we do not get value received when we pay them. It is the manner of paying that irks; the sugar-coating that causes us to swallow them without knowing it, and the pyramiding that follows as a result of the

consumer's complacency. Those who are engaged in the effort to expose these hidden taxes so the consumer may know them when he meets them in the road, are to be commended, because when the women who do most of the buying across the counter realize what a hole the unseen taxes make in their budget dollar, something is liable to pop, and legislators will be more cautious with appropriations


