FAILS TO OKEY CO. FARM AGENT

Wilkes County Office Is Declared Vacant; Said Freas Inexperienced


North Wilkesboro, July 3-The office of Wilkes county farm agent has been declared vacant. Authorities of the North Carolina extension service refused to approve the election by the county board of commissioners of Edward M. Freas, of Traphill, county agent to succeed Dan F.

O. F. McCrary, district agent of the extension service, told the county commissioners that the election of Freas could not be approved because of his lack of experience in the work. The duties the county agent, administration of the AAA program, compose a great responsi-McCrary said, and the state office could not approve the selection by the county commissioners of an inexperienced man as county agent.

The board of county commissioners on Friday notified County Agent Dan Holler that the office of county agent was declared vacant, effective July 1.

The salary of the county agent is paid jointly by the county and the state and federal governments.

The extension service authorities are asking the reappointment of Holler, pointing out that his services have been highly satisfactory.
