

FORMER SURRY SHERIFF HURT

Accident Near Mount Airy Claims Life Surry Youth Friday Night

COUPE, TRUCK COLLIDE

Ulysses G. Belton, 73, of Mount Airy, a former sheriff of Surry county, was seriously injured Friday night in an automobile accident which claimed the life of Ray Arnder, 13-year-old Bannertown school boy, who was riding with the former Surry officer.

Chester Arnder, 11, the third occupant of the car, was also critically injured.

The accident occurred one mile south of Mount Airy in the Bannertown community when Belton's light coupe collided almost head-on with a truck, which was driven by G. U. Sprinkle, 22, of Troutville, Va. The truck, which was owned by H. H. and H. L. Hancock, of Troutville, was north bound after carrying a load of lime to Henderson.

Belton, who carries on extensive farming operations in and near Mount Airy, was driving the Arnder boys to their home near Bannertown and had started to turn into a side road toward the boys' home when the collision occurred.

Ray Arnder, son of George and Ellen Gates Arnder, died soon after reaching Martin Memorial hospital here, death resulting from a fractured skull, a severely lacerated throat and other injuries. Chester Arnder, the younger of the brothers, remained unconscious and hospital authorities said his condition was critical. Mr. Belton suffered fractures of both legs near the knee and undetermined chest injuries.

The accident was investigated by Sheriff Harvey Boyd and Deputy E. H. Jones who held the driver of the truck in custody pending a probable charge of manslaughter.

Former President Herbert Hoover Says America Must Stay Out of War

San Francisco, Sept. 1.—Herbert Hoover, whose World War record helped pave his way to the presidency of the United States, tonight said American sympathies are with democracies, but "America must keep out of war."

"This is one of the saddest days that has come to humanity in 100 years," said the only living former president in a statement.

"The situation in the world today is not the act of the German people. It is the act of a group who hold them in subjection. The whole Nazi system is repugnant to the American people. The most of American sympathies will be with the democracies."

"Whatever our sympathies are, we cannot solve the problems of Europe. America must keep out of this war. The President and Congress should be supported in their every effort to keep us out. We can keep out if we have the resolute national will to do so. We can be of more service to Europe and humanity if we preserve the vitality and strength of the United States for use in the period of peace which must some-

time come. And we must keep out if we are to preserve for civilization the foundations of democracy and free men."

Hoover pointed out that the war which has begun will kill millions of the world's best and most courageous men, as well as killing and starving millions of women and children.

"It means another quarter of a century of impoverishment to the whole world," Hoover continued. "It will likely be a long war. It is possible that Poland may be overrun in a few months. But there seems no point of access from which an overwhelming attack can be delivered from the British and French on one side and the Germans and Italians on the other, which might quickly end the war. It is likely to be a war of slow attrition."

"While assurances have been given that there will be no bombing of women and children, there may come a time of desperation when all restraints go to the wind. It is likely to be the most barbarous war that we have ever known."

SCHOOL MASTER CLUB HAS MEET

Plans for Opening 1939-40 School Term in Surry Are Discussed

COMMITTEE IS NAMED

The Surry School Masters' club, composed of principals of the white schools of the Surry county educational system, gathered in the office of Supt. John W. Comer in Dobson on Wednesday night of last week for the first meeting of the 1939-40 school term. Virtually all principals in the county were present for the meeting.

Hoyle S. Broome, principal of the White Plains high school, was named president of the club for the year, being moved up from the vice-presidency to succeed Charles F. Hiatt, who was elected last spring but is not teaching this year. M. G. Stanley, principal of Beulah high school, was named vice-president, while E. R. Ray, of Green Hill elementary school, is secretary again this year.

The school heads discussed various problems arising from the opening of the new term, one of their actions being the approval of the new flat rental fee of \$3 for high school pupils, this fee to cover all book rentals and the individual library fees. They also discussed the problems arising from transportation and NYA work. A committee, composed of J. Mark McAdams, of Elkin, J. Sam Gentry, of Mountain Park, and M. G. Stanley, of Beulah, was named to plan a new report card.

Five of the schools took a definite stand in favor of introducing six-man football this fall, adding a new autumn sport to lessen the emphasis on basketball that has prevailed in Surry county for several years. The schools expected to play six-man football this season are Flat Rock, Copeland, Westfield, Pilot Mountain and Dobson. Further plans for the sport will be laid by representatives of these schools.
