

## ARE TO HONOR WAR VETERANS

Will Unveil Memorial to  
World War Veterans of  
Surry Armistice Day  
IS TO BE AT DOBSON

A memorial to Surry county World War veterans will be dedicated at special ceremonies to be held in Dobson on Armistice Day, November 11, under the supervision of a committee consisting of Mrs. R. J. Lovell, of Mount Airy, John S. Llewellyn, of Dobson, and W. M. Allen, of Elkin, it has been announced.

Funds for the erection of this monument were raised by school children of Surry county some years ago under the supervision of A. H. Wolfe, W. F. Carter and E. S. Hendren. The monument is now being completed and will bear the names of over 900 Surry county men who answered the call of duty in the last World War.

The Elkin and Mount Airy posts of the American Legion are cooperating in making this notable celebration of Armistice Day, and tentative plans for the program include a talk by a nationally-known speaker, whose identity has not been revealed. Full details of the program will be announced later, it was said.
