AYRSHIRES AT LONG CREEK LEAD STATE

The 15 Ayrshires owned in the Long Creek Lodge herd of R. J. Reynolds, Jr., at Devotion completed the highly creditable herd average of 940 lbs. 4.60% milk, 37.58 lbs. butterfat on twice-a-day milking during the month of August. This herd average gives the Long Creek Lodge herd the distinction of ranking first among all herds in the state of North Carolina tested under the rules of the Ayrshire Herd Test during that month.

Topping the herd in individual production record during the month was Sycamore Liberta, a four-year-old, that contributed a yield of 1426 lbs. milk, 65.60 lbs. butterfat.

Lady Sylvan Cecile M, a nine-year-old, was runner-up with 1476 lbs. milk, 53.14 lbs. fat.
