

# FARMERS ASKED TO SLOW PACE

Record Rate of Tobacco Sales Causing Congestion at Warehouses

## COULD AFFECT PRICES

Washington, Oct. 23.—J. B. Hutson, assistant agricultural adjustment administrator, appealed to southern flue-cured tobacco growers today to slow up the pace at which they have been selling their leaf since the markets reopened earlier this month.

Hutson issued a statement saying marketing was "proceeding at a record rate," causing congestion at warehouses and redrying plants with a subsequent damaging of tobacco.

This, he added, "doubtless has caused prices to be lower in many cases."

The markets were closed nearly a month because of depressed prices resulting from a withdrawal of foreign buyers when the European war broke out. During the shutdown, the Agriculture Department formulated a

program to finance foreign buying.

Hutson said although prices this season to date had not been high, there had been some uniformity since the markets reopened and added "there does not appear to be any reason for rushing tobacco to market at this time."

"If farmers could slow down movement of tobacco so as to clear up the present congestion I would be more inclined to expect a small advance in prices than any decline from the levels that have prevailed during the past two weeks."

"Certainly tobacco will bring more if it is marketed in an orderly manner than if it is rushed to market and either damaged before it is sold or forced into redrying and prizing plants where it may be damaged before it can be redried and put in hogsheads."

Hutson said growers could do more to correct the present congestion than anyone else.

He said 200,000,000 pounds had been sold from October 10 to October 20.

This movement, Hutson added, exceeded by far sales during any corresponding period in any previous year.

Mrs. O. L. Brown is at the Duke hospital for treatment, we are sorry to note.

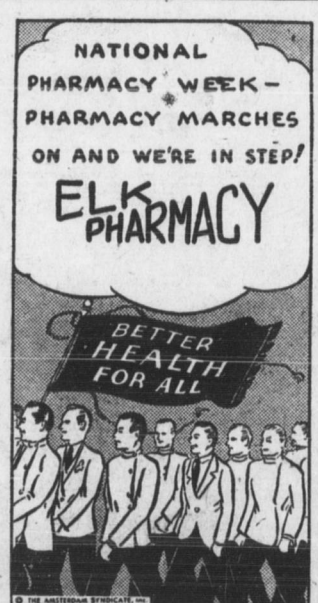
The protracted meeting will begin at Flat Rock church the fifth Sunday in this month with the Rev. Charlie Holland doing the preaching.
