MRS. McADAMS MAKES TALK TO KIWANIANS

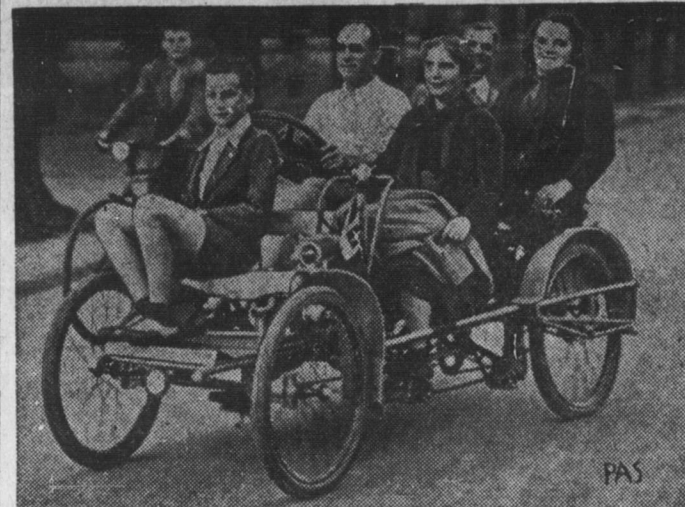
