

# ROLL CALL GOES OVER THE TOP

Yadkin County's Campaign Surpasses 1938 Drive By Large Margin

## ALL PARTS SHOW GAIN

Complete returns from every section of Yadkin county show that the annual Red Cross Membership Drive was a complete success and that it surpassed last year's drive by a large majority, according to figures compiled yesterday by County Roll Call Chairman W. E. Rutledge.

According to Mr. Rutledge, the number of memberships secured last year was 194. Last reports show that this year's lists show a membership of 264, which is 70 more than 1938. In addition to this there was one donation of \$2.00 by "A friend of the cause" at Jonesville and one \$5.00 membership at Yadkinville.

One half of this money will go to the National Red Cross headquarters in Washington, of which John W. Hanes, formerly of Winston-Salem and now assistant secretary of the U. S. Treasury, is treasurer. This will be used in disasters, famines, etc., in many parts of the country. The other half will be used in Yadkin county to aid those who suffer misfortune, sickness, and other needy causes. A small amount of money was advanced for needy purposes before the roll call began when last year's funds were exhausted. This was advanced by Mr. Rutledge, who is treasurer of the Yadkin group and will now be returned to him.

Such a response to a worthy cause in Yadkin county is gratifying to workers who have given their time and energy without pay, as all of them do. Each local chairman and their co-workers deserve much praise and credit for the work done.

Special mention should be made here of the work done by Mrs. High Poindexter of Huntsville. Mrs. Poindexter was not a local chairman, but after the drive started she was assigned the Huntsville territory by Mrs. Jasper Long who had charge of that section. Mrs. Long reports that Mrs. Poindexter was a great help to her in the work and it is appreciated by all concerned.

The largest number of members secured in any district was in Yadkinville where a total of 70 joined. The next largest was Jonesville with 46.

A complete list of those who joined up during the drive is given below. A few names listed below gave smaller donations than the \$1.00 membership fee, but there was less than half a dozen of them. The complete list follows:

## Finns Say Territory Is Uninhabited

munications center of Rovaniemi, where Finland's Arctic highway continues northeast to Petsamo and a railway runs southward to the Gulf of Bothnia between Finland and Sweden.

To support this drive, the Soviet union continued the landing of thousands of troops along Petsamo Fjord and aerial forays for reconnoitering and bombing.

Finns, fighting stubbornly in the cold and twilight of the arctic, told of repulsing sporadic Russian attacks and of shooting down a Russian bombing plane. A detachment of 200 Red soldiers, apparently part of the parachute infantry dropped in northern Finland, was said to have been captured near Salmijarvi on the Finnish-Norwegian border.

Thousands of Finns strung all along the nation's lake-studded frontier facing Russia observed independence day while clinging to their trenches or pillboxes, or giving ground slightly before the Red onslaught. Finnish aviation had opened its

## Winnie Judd, Trunk Slayer, Escapes Again

Phoenix, Ariz., Dec. 3.—Winnie Ruth Judd, insane trunk murderer, escaped tonight from the Arizona state hospital for the second time within a month.

Gov. Bob Jones, who told of her escape, said he had no details. He added, however, that she had been gone from the grounds for only a short time and that hospital officials hoped she would be apprehended shortly.

On the night of October 24, Mrs. Judd, mad murderer, heap-

ed a mound of boxes, bottles and cakes of soap in her bed, and slipped out of the state hospital for the insane. Her escape, undiscovered for more than 12 hours, added another lurid chapter to the spectacular career of the "blonde tigress," who in 1931 killed two women friends, dismembered their bodies and expressed the grisly cargo in trunks to Los Angeles. She was captured in the grounds of the state hospital nearly a week later.

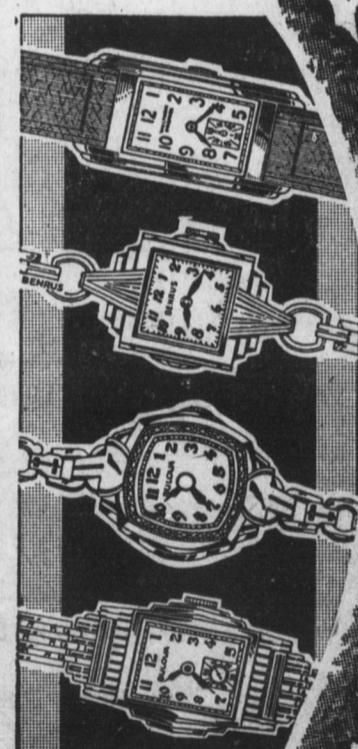
