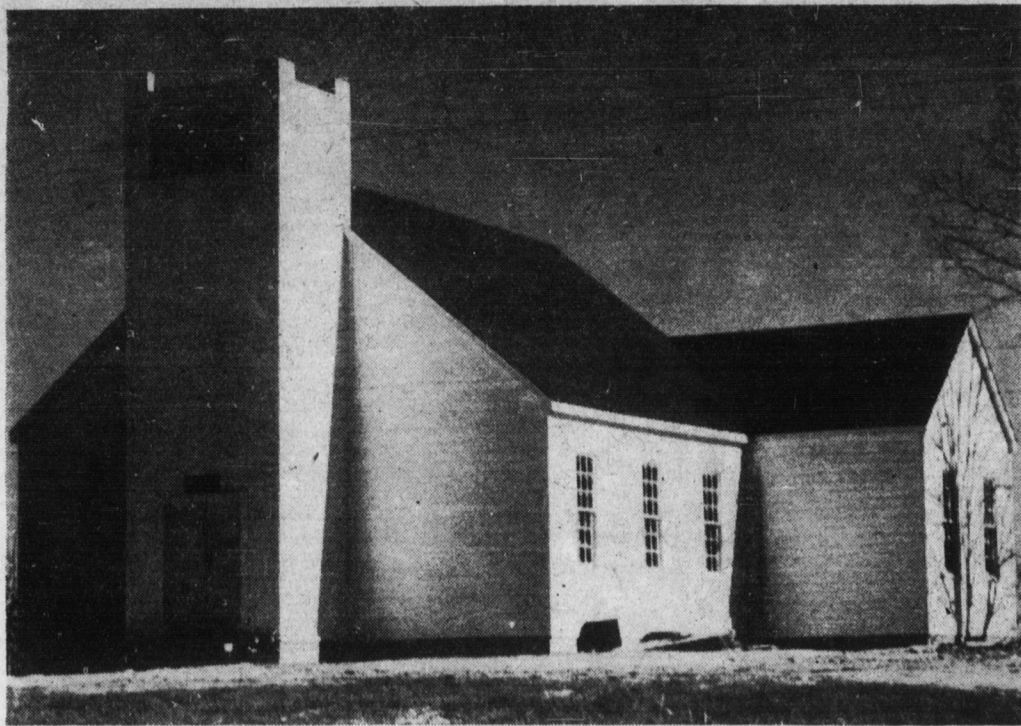

New Home of Island Ford Baptist Church



Pictured above is the attractive new home of the Island Ford Baptist church, located on the Elkin-Boonville highway a few miles east of Elkin. This impressive new structure has not yet been completed inside, although the congregation occupied it last Sunday for the first time. It is expected to be dedicated within the next 60 days.

Rev. Richard J. Pardue, pastor of the church for 17 years, stated that the new building contains, in addition to the main auditorium, six Sunday School rooms, four of which are located in the basement. It is heated by a central heating plant.

Plans for the building were drawn by members of the congregation, which numbers about 120 members. A majority of the labor in constructing the building was done by members, Rev. Mr. Pardue said.

The old church building, which is over 100 years old, was outgrown. It has been sold and will be torn down.

Services are held at Island Ford every fourth Sunday.

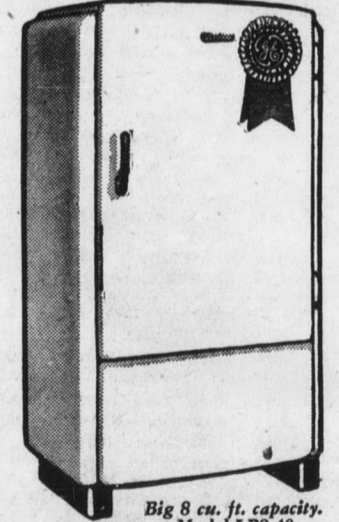
