> London, May 29.—The Allies have captured the Norwegian iron ore port of Narvik from German troops, seven weeks after its occupation in the German far northern blitzkrieg, the admiralty and war office said today, and authoritative British sources said that the British expeditionary force. trapped in Belgium and northern France, still was intact.
