## Miss Boles Is Feted at Party Tuesday Evening

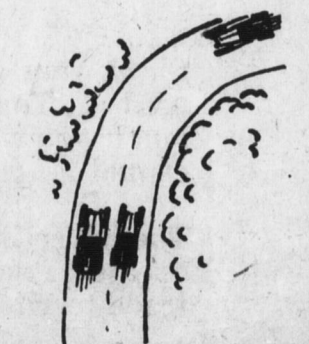

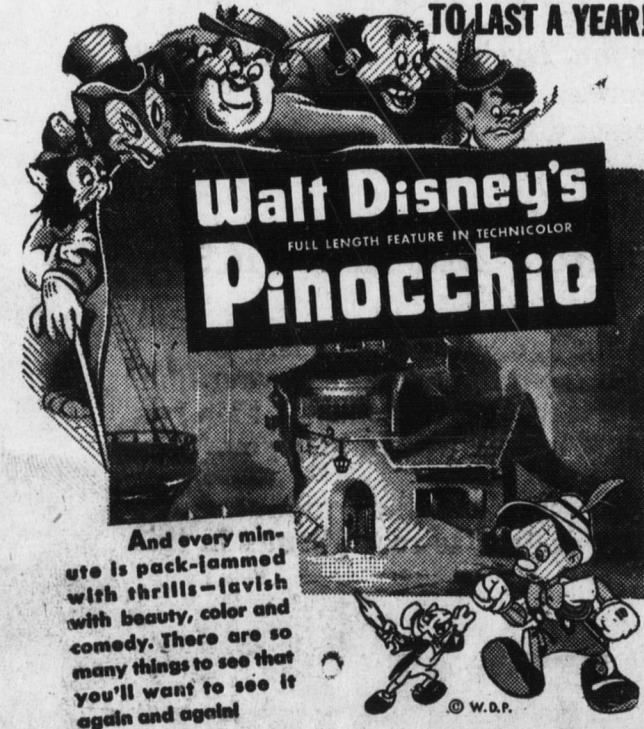
