at which time the plans will be publicly opened and read for the furnishing of all labor and materials for the authorized addition to the Elkin Elementary School, located in Elkin, North Carolina. Consideration will be given only to bidders for contracts who submit evidence showing that the laws of the State of North Carolina pertaining to bids and contracts have been duly complied with.

No bidder may withdraw his bid within a period of thirty days. Each proposal must be accompanied by a certified check drawn on a bank or trust company authorized to do business in North Carolina made payable to the Surry County Board of Education in the amount of five per cent. of the bid.

A performance bond will be required in the amount of one hundred per cent. of the contract price considered upon the faithful performance of the contract and upon the payment of all persons supplying labor and furnishing materials for the completion of the work. In the event of failure of the successful bidder to furnish said bond and issue the contract in ten days after notice of acceptance of his proposal, the five per cent. check will be forfeited to the Board of Education as demanded.



Time of completion is an important factor as school will open in September and will be considered in the awarding of the contract.
