Holyfield, who is teacher of the adult classes, has recently completed a course in first aid at W. C. U. N. C., Greensboro, getting her instructor's certificate. She now has twelve pupils enrolled in her class, which will finish the course about August 16.

An examination will be given at the end of the course and those passing with a grade of not less than 75 per cent will receive standard certificates from the American Red Cross. The course covers ten lessons each of two hours. A new class will be organized about the 19th of August, and anyone wishing to enroll in this class will please see Mrs. Holyfield within the next two weeks.

In order to be eligible for examination the student is expected to attend all lessons or make lost time.
