Dobson Woman's Club Erects New Building

A new club building, started by three months ago, is now receiving the finishing touches and was used as an assembly place for the club the first time on Thursday of last week. The new building, which is very attractively arranged, was built at a cost of approximately \$3,000. The floor plans include an assembly room, large enough to accommodate a large crowd, a library room, which will be stocked with books by the club members, and a club kitchen.

The Dobson Woman's club, which is one of the most active civic organizations in the county, has a membership of 60, with the present officers including Mrs. John W. Comer, president; Mrs. J. W. Crawford, vice-president, and Mrs. Theford Sprinkle, secretary.

The Adult School in our community is being well attended. Classes meet in the Sunday school room of the Methodist church four afternoons each week. Classes in home making and leisure time activity meet, and the material used in these classes for piecing quilts, making aprons, etc., is free. There are twenty women enrolled in these classes.

On Wednesday afternoon literacy is taught in the homes, also new illiterates enrolled. On Monday, Wednesday and Friday nights of each week first aid is taught at the class room. Mrs. Alma B. Holyfield, who is teacher of the adult classes, has recently completed a course in first aid at W. C. U. N. C., Greensboro, getting her instructor's certificate. She now has twelve pupils enrolled in her class, which will finish the course about August 16.

An examination will be given at the end of the course and those passing with a grade of not less than 75 per cent will receive standard certificates from the American Red Cross. The course covers ten lessons each of two hours. A new class will be organized about the 19th of August, and anyone wishing to enroll in this class will please see Mrs. Holyfield within the next two weeks.

In order to be eligible for examination the student is expected to attend all lessons or make up lost time.
