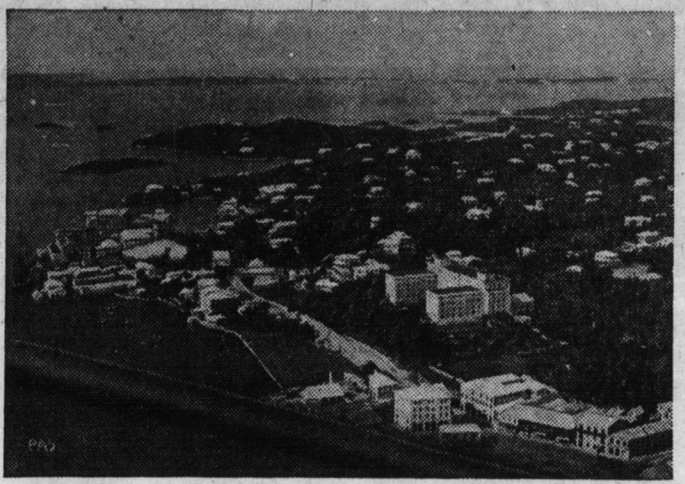

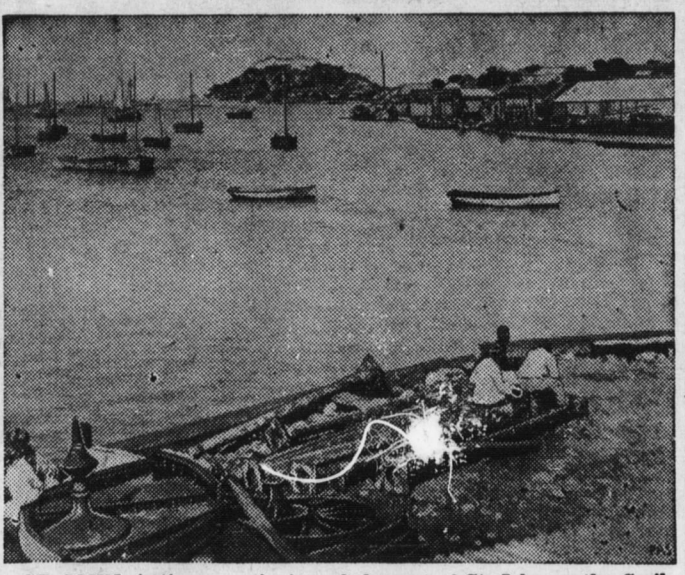
WHAT U.S. GOT FOR 50 SHIPS

Caribbean Base



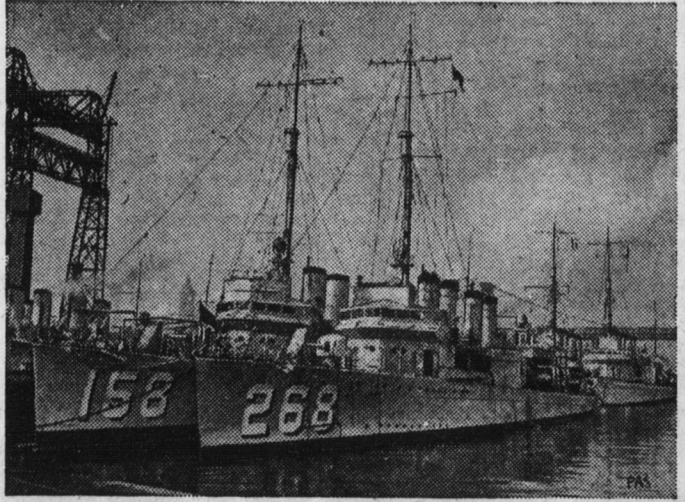

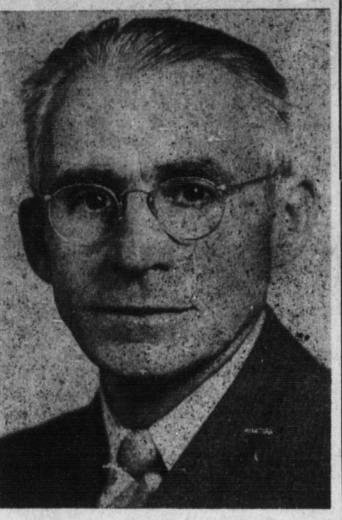
The building is expected to be completed by October 1.
