RELATIONS BETWEEN NATIONS IN NEW PHASE

Washington, Nov. 20.—Relations between the United States and France entered an apparently new phase today, coincident with increasing reports that Marshal Henri Petain was showing a disposition to go slow in collaboating with the axis powers.

First tangible sign of a possible hange was the fact that Robert D. Murphy, a veteran of ten years diplomatic service in France before and during the war, was ordered back to Vichy to take up the duties of charge d'affaires. Murphy, formerly counselor at the assy, has been in the country for several months.
