
The hostess served a delicious salad course during the afternoon.

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

## Chocolate Peppermint Cookies

Broadcast by Mary Lee Taylor  
December 5, 1940

2 cups sifted cake flour **1** cup sugar  
2 teaspoons baking powder **1/4** teaspoon pepper-mint extract or  
1/2 cup coco **8** drops of peppermint  
1/2 cup salt **1/2** cup soft butter or  
1/2 cup shortening **1** unbeaten egg  
**1** cup Pet Mills

Turn oven on set at moderately hot (400°F.). Resift flour with baking powder, cocoa and salt. Cream butter, sugar and extract together until light and fluffy. Add egg and beat vigorously. Add flour mixture alternately with milk, beginning and ending with flour. Beat until smooth after each addition. Drop from side of teaspoon onto greased baking sheet to form oblong shapes. Bake 10 minutes, or until cookies are brown. Makes about 4 dozen.
