Folks Should Tell Firemen Where Fire Is

Ted Brown, chief of the Elkin fire department, said Tuesday that it is highly important for people who call in to report fires to give the telephone operator the address as well as the name of the person's home which is on fire.

Since the Chatham Manufacturing Company has moved its finishing plant here, Chief Brown stated, so many new people are living here that it is impossible for the firemen to know where all live, and if the address is not given in every case, the fire department may not be able to reach the scene quickly.

It was also pointed out that citizens who move from one neighborhood to another should tell some member of the department of their move so that in case of fire the department will go to the right address. An instance of the firemen having to hunt the fire was reported here a week or so ago, no one knowing where the family in need lived.

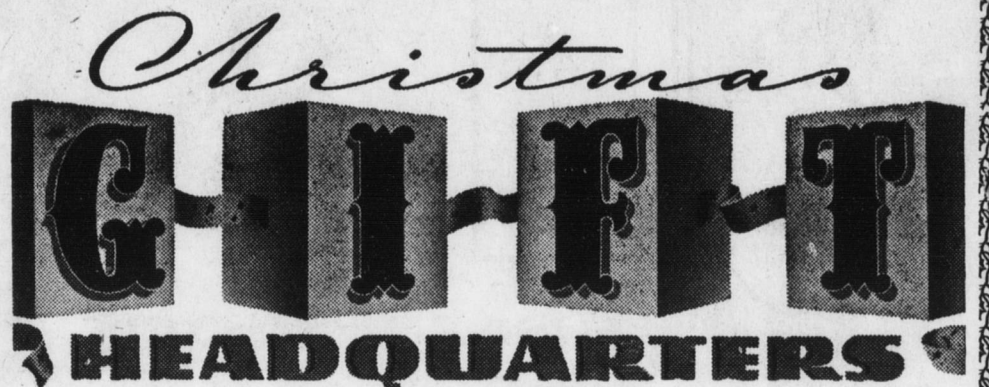

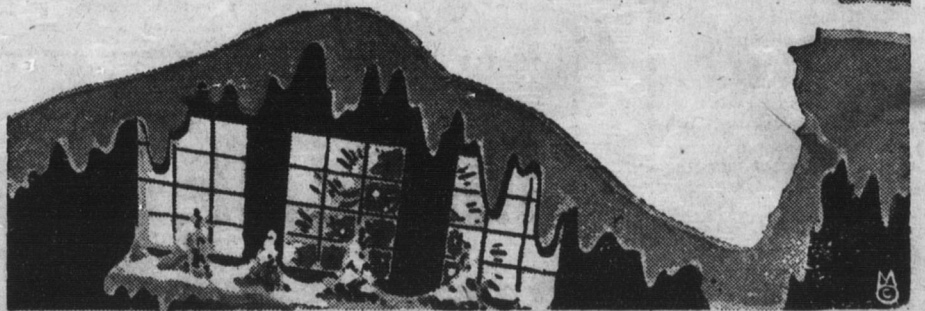
