Air Force Is Now Giving Effective Support

REDS MOVE FORWARD

Nazi Troops Are Said Ordered Shot If They Attempt To Retreat

POSITIONS ARE SMASHED

London, Dec. 9.-Allied ground forces their position improved by counterattacks and increased protection from their air forces, kept Axis columns in the Tebourba area of Tunisia under continual artillery bombardment today.

An allied headquarters announcement broadcast by radio Morocco said American and British air forces, with American pilots playing a major part, were now giving effective support to the hard-pressed forward units of Liut Gen. Kenneth A. N. Anderson's ground forces in the northern Tunisia defense triangle.

"After the allied counterattack in the region of Tebourba," it said. "Axis columns have been continually under fierce allied artil-

lery fire." American and British tanks had smashed a German effort to penetrate allied positions west of Tebourba, driving back enemy Mrs. Jewel Banks was elected armoured columns after they had knifed their way into the allied lines. The Germans withdrew after heavy fighting, Lieut. Gen Dwight D. Eisenhower, allied commander, announced in an offical
