News from Abroad of Valuable Mineral Discoveries in Surry County. Parley, Mo., Star.

An under-current of interest is said to be manifested among certain expert mineralogists and geologists in the West, over some samples of rock, taken recently from Surry county, N. C. One shows a rich quality of tin ore; another has some beautiful garnet gems embedded in a greenish micaceous granite. It is claimed that this county is very rich in precious minerals; that an area of ten acres is covered on the surface with a solid body of black oxide of manganese; and that there is an unlimited amount of blue specular and magnetic iron ores, to say nothing of fine clays mica and asbestos to be found there; yet the county has never been prospected nor worked—not even a geological report has ever been made.
