Newspaper Men Began Arriving in Atlanta Sunday Night for Two Days' Convention.

ATLANTA, Ga., March 15. The 12th annual convention of the Southern Newspaper Publishers' association will be held here tomorrow and Tuesday. Newspaper men began to arrive here today for the meeting.

Advertising, newspaper circulation and newspaper taxes are the chief subjects to be considered. In addition to southern newspaper publishers who will speak, Dan C. Sells, general manager of the New York World, and Jason Rogers, publisher of the New York Globe, are to address the convention. Mr. Sells will speak of "The Editorial Ideal and Good Business," "The 'They Conflict'" and Mr. Rogers will discuss "Advertising Newspaper Development."

Another speaker will be John Stuart Bryan, of the Richmond, Va., Times-Dispatch.

### NASH ELECTS WHOLE TIME COUNTY HEALTH OFFICER.

At a recent meeting of the Nash County Board of Health Dr. B. E. Washburn of Rutherfordton was unanimously elected Whole Time County Health Officer.

Dr. Washburn was elected from a list of twelve or fifteen applicants for the position and is considered unusually qualified for such work.

Dr. Washburn holds the degree of A. B., A. M. and M. D. being a graduate of the University of North Carolina and Virginia. For several years he was physician at both institutions, later graduating in medicine at the University of Virginia. He spent one year in total blindness and had a year in partial blindness in his own eyes. This in part up to receipt a position with The North-Carolina Sanitary Commission at Rutherfordton, in which capacity he has been employed for the past year.

Nash county is fortunate in securing the services of this particularly qualified young physician who will do all his office time to preventing sickness and reducing the death rate in that county.


