MAKES SPLENDID SHOWING.

Those who took the pains to make
a careful study of the report of the
Water and Light Commission for last
year, published a few days ago in this
paper, must have felt gratified at the
splendid showing made. The report
showed that the gross receipts from
the water and light plants for the
year were \$29,976.31, while the ex-
penses, including extension and dis-
counts to customers were \$29,992.91,
leaving a profit of \$8,582.40. The ex-
tension to the plant amounted to \$14,
518.62. The increase of gross receipts
last year over the previous year was
\$7,735.93.

In addition to the excellent showing
of the past year, it should be consid-
ered that the plant is entitled to a
further credit of about \$8,000 for pub-
lic service rendered the town without
cost, this not being carried in the re-
port. Prior to two years ago the town
paid out of its general fund to the
Water and Light Commission a cer-
tain sum each month for the public
service, but this was discontinued af-
ter the plant became self-sustaining.
While the people of the town general-
ly are benefited by the saving of this
amount in the general fund, the
individual consumer of electric current
and water has received a further ben-
efit in the increased discount that was
given on service the past year.

Some idea of the development of the
plant is shown in the amount expen-
ded for extensions during the past
year. Both light and water service
lines have been extended until the
limits of the town in nearly all di-
rection have been reached. There
has also been a large increase in the
number of electric motors used in man-
ufacturing enterprises. Two years
ago 33 horse power was the aggregate
of electric motors in use, while now
the total reaches 250 horse power.

There are establishments that
have eighty-five (85) horse pow-
er each and a great many that
use motors from two to twenty horse
power. They find that electric pow-
er is cheaper and more convenient
than either gas or steam. As the ca-
pacity of the water and light plants
increases, there will be more of our
manufacturing enterprises to take
advantage of electric current.

Much credit for the splendid de-
velopment of the municipal plant is
due to the efficient management of
Superintendent H. L. Allen, who took
charge two years ago. He is a tireless
worker and constantly on the look-
out for development and additional
customers. Since he has been in
charge there has been not only the
increase in business noted, but also
the physical condition and efficiency
of the plant has been material im-
proved.

People who but seldom get out in
the southwestern section of the town,
can hardly realize the big business
going on in the manufacturing enter-
prises out that way. At any rate
that was our experience upon taking a
trip through that section the other
afternoon. Dail's brick yard, the
Greenville Cooperation & Lumber Co.,
the ice plant, the ginney and ferti-
lizer factory, the Pitt Lumber Manu-
factory Company, the Utility Machine
Shop, with several tobacco factories a
little nearer in, make it a very busy
quarters. And just over beyond the
buildings for the cotton mill are set
up rapidly. Verily Greenville is grow-
ing as never before.
