Russians Advancing to Lorraine Driving Germans Back Heaviest Fighting In Vicinity Of Montdidier, Where Germans Have Great Strength.

Turkey Expected to Enter Into War Today. Austrian Army Withdrawn From Lemburg. Allies Driven Back to Oise Fifty Miles From Paris. British Losses Are Heavy, Hundreds Have Been Killed And Wounded

LONDON, Sept. 2—Russian embassy has announced that Russian "Slowly advancing toward Lorraine where a regular siege of German entrenched positions was in progress driving the Germans back for the last two days. They suffered partial checks at Meuse and Chateau Palsseul district. They compelled the French to withdraw their lines near Meuse. The left wing was attacked by a greatly superior force in Chateau Cumbrai district and retired southward. They drove the tenth German army corps back at Oise on account of the progress of the German right they were unable to follow up to advantage. General movements continue along the lines planned." All the military hospitals in South Paris were filled to their capacity with many wounded British.

FORMING ADVANCE GUARD.

PARIS, Sept. 2—The allied lines of the French left engaged along the line extending from Montdidier into Forest Campiegne and the heaviest fighting is in the vicinity of Montdidier where the German Infantry has great strength and a large force of German skirmishers forming advance guard and movement toward Paris. A party surrounded general Paul Pau and retrieved situation of Lorraine that is now under command of French left wing co-operating with Sir John of the French.

WIRELESS STATION ATTACKED.

ANTWERP, Sept. 2—Zeppelin was flying at the height of six thousand feet and dropped a bomb into the city. An attempt against wireless station but missed the mark. Zeppelin was forced to fly before a heavy Fusillado cannon and rifle fire from the fort. Four civilians were injured from Zeppelin bombs.

ARTILLERY FIRE ANNIHILATING.

ROME, Sept. 2—The Austrian army fighting from Lemburg has withdrawn. Did not enter city. General staff wished to have Lemburg bombarded. Eighth day fighting finds Austrian out numbered and hard pressed casualties are appalling on both sides. The artillery fire is described as annihilating. Whole bridges are mown down. They have no time to bury the dead and they collect the wounded while the battle is raging over them.

RUSSIANS THROG AUSTRIA

LONDON, Sept. 2—Russian embassy has announced that "Russian advance will throng Austria. Galicia continues in a most successful manner."

AUSTRIANS ROUTED AT POINT OF BAYONETS

ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 2—Sweeping success over the Austrians reported at war office. It was announced that Russian left wing was operating from a position on Dneister and captured supposedly impregnable Austrian and heavily garrison position of Russians charged, position at point of bayonet swept over entrenchments completely routing the Austrian troops and five thousand Austrians were left dead in the field. The Russian have captured thirty-two big guns, more than a thousand prisoners including Commanding General is result of the success of the Russian left. Not being able to co-operate with center and retreat the Austrians were seriously menaced.

THREE HUNDREDS MILES OF BATTLE

ROME, Sept. 2—Vienna dispatches state that a three hundred mile of battle from Prussia to the Dneister river have reached a height of fury. The Austrians have abandoned Lemburg after the bloodiest fighting battle. The Russian general staff are attempting to annihilate the entire Austrian army.

BRITISH LOSS SEVERE.

LONDON, Sept. 2—General French reports of the British losses was early fighting and killed one hundred and sixty, wounded six hundred and eighty, and there was missing forty two hundred and seventy. War office announced that the National relief fund started, Prince of Wales funds have reached ten million dollars.

ALLIES DRIVEN BACK.

PARIS, Sept. 2—It is officially stated that the Allies center holds the battle lines that run east and west through departments Oise Aisne Ariennes. It is admitted that the Allies were driven back to Oise within fifty miles of Paris.

PARIS, Sept. 2—War office admits that the French are slowly advancing in Lorraine. A general engagement is in progress in the vicinity of Meuse.

MAYOR JAMES HAS BUSY SESSION IN HIS COURT

Many Cases Disposed of And Fines Imposed

SOME WERE SENT TO JAIL

While Others Were Let Off By Paying The Cost in The Case

Monday morning Mayor J. B. James, disposed of a lengthy docket and the Mayor did not forget to show the law breakers that he had the authority to have peace.

The court disposed of the following cases:

Albert Broughton using vulgar and profane language in a public place, pleads guilty and that the defendant be confined in the county jail for 15 days and a fine of \$5.00.

Ida Jarvis, engaged in disorderly conduct and using vulgar and profane language in a public place, pleads guilty and that the defendant be confined in the county jail for 15 days and pay the cost.

Easter Wilson and James Wilson engaged in disorderly conduct and mutually assaulting each other, each pay a fine of \$3.00 and 1-2 cost each.

Rora Lee May, engaged in disorderly conduct and using vulgar and profane language in a public place pleads guilty and sentenced to remain in the county jail for a period of 15 days and all cost.

John Smith, engaged in disorderly conduct and using profane language in public place pleads not guilty, fine \$2.00 and cost.

Jennie McCollough, Martia Brown, and Fliza Williams, engaged in disorderly conduct and assaulting each other, McCollough guilty, Brown and Williams not guilty, McCollough pay 1-2 cost and be confined to the county jail for 15 days.

Rosa Day, and John Day assaulting each other pleads not guilty each pay a fine of \$1.00 and cost.

Carv Battle, driving an automobile over the streets at a greater speed than eight miles per hour and in a reckless manner, pleads not guilty, fined \$5.00 and cost. Being unable to pay the cost was directed over to the county hotel for 30 days and to be worked on the county roads to pay the cost.

Jasper Cherry, assaulting Fred Skip per, pleads guilty fined \$2.00 and cost.

Joe Otterbridge driving a motor-cycl over the streets at a greater speed than eight miles and in a reckless manner pleads guilty fined \$4.00 and cost.

Jesse Barnes engaged in riotous and disorderly conduct pleads guilty fined \$2.00 and cost.

Cotton Storage
