

No Civil Pension.

Washington, Oct. 6-Daniel C. Roper, first assistant postmaster general, told the convention of Postmasters from Virginia, Maryland, North and South Carolina and Delaware today that the American public never would support civil pensions and that superannuated employes should not be

kept in the postal service. He expressed belief that postmasters should post notices informing employes that they will be retained only so long as they are capable of earning the salaries paid them and that sala ries will be scaled and readjusted to meet the declining efficiency and eraning power of the older clerks and car-
