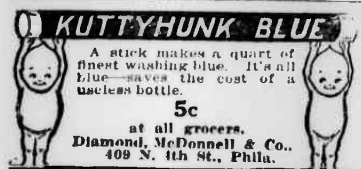

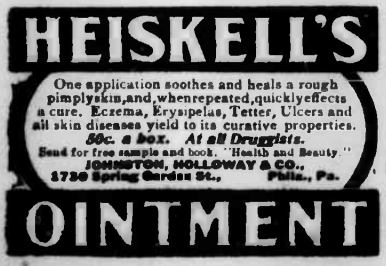

### WORLD'S SERIES.

Schedule of Games and Players Who Are Eligible.

The first two games between the Philadelphia Americans and the Boston Nationals for the baseball championship will be played in Philadelphia on October 9 and 10, and the third and fourth in Boston October 12 and 13. The fifth game will be played in Philadelphia October 14 and the sixth game in Boston October 15, if more than four games are necessary to decide the series.

This was decided here at a meeting of the National Baseball Commission. As heretofore four games must be won by a club to claim the championship. In the event of a seventh game the toss of a coin after the sixth contest will decide whether the seventh shall be played in Boston or Philadelphia. In case of a tie or postponement the clubs will remain in the city where the game was scheduled until it is decided.

### No Civil Pension.

Washington, Oct. 6.—Daniel C. Roper, first assistant postmaster general, told the convention of Postmasters from Virginia, Maryland, North and South Carolina and Delaware today that the American public never would support civil pensions and that superannuated employes should not be kept in the postal service.

He expressed belief that postmasters should post notices informing employes that they will be retained only so long as they are capable of earning the salaries paid them and that salaries will be scaled and readjusted to meet the declining efficiency and earning power of the older clerks and carriers.
