THREE SCHOOLS VOTES SPECIAL SCHOOL TAX

Pitt county took another forward educational step Saturday, April 17, when three school districts were added to the special local tax column. These districts were Clay Root in Swift Creek Township, Bynum in Farmville Township, and Stokes in Carolina Township. Considerable interest had been manifested in these elections, and the friends of the measure were confident of success. This makes at present sixteen local tax districts in Pitt county, and complete list by Townships being: Greenville—Greenville, Joyners, Farmville—Farmville, Langs Cross Roads, Bynum, Contentnea—Ayden, Bethel—Bethel, Swift Creek—Grifton, Gardenersville, Hanrahan, Clay Root, Falkland—Fountain, Bruce, King's Cross Roads, Chicod—Grimesland, Carolina—Stokes.

There are a number of other districts contemplating such a move, and it is expected that this list of progressive communities will be increased rapidly. The local tax idea is spreading. There is no better or easier way to increase the usefulness and efficiency of the schools, and the people are finding this out.

In addition to the elections referred to above, the people in the Grifton school district voted April 16 to levy a special tax not to exceed twenty cents for the maintenance of a high school. This is in addition to their regular thirty cent tax.

Notes of Interest From the Colored Schools

The Citizens of Pitt county, who are interested in the general betterment of conditions will be gratified to learn that the seed sown by the local Board of Graded School Trustees, have germinated and there is a broadening of the Industrial work fostered and encouraged by those in charge of the city's school system.

The "Principal" more than two years ago sought the influence of the lamented W. H. Ragsdale, to be used in urging Dr. Dillard, who has charge of the "Anna Jeanes Fund" to appoint a supervisor for this County, death claimed him before anything could be accomplished.

A new man came on the scene as County Superintendent Prof. S. B. Underwood, who at once took up the proposition and then State Supervisor Newbold of the Department of Education thought at first there was no available funds, provisions were made and a supervisor for the county was appointed.

January 1st 1915 found the Industrial County Supervisor Lucy B. Richmond reporting for duty. A new county superintendent could not give all the information necessary to the proper performance of the work, hence she went forth with courage, and determination to reach the fifty two schools under her supervision and with the co-operation of the teachers to accomplish helpful results.

In a very short time the county's educational officer saw her worth and added to the Industrial Supervision the Academic Supervision of Colored School.

She at once entered upon this phase of the work with the same spirit as characterized the successful men and women who have achieved lasting results for mankind in the past. Every school has been visited, every teacher seen, and basket parties have been held in the different sections of the county to raise money for the improvement of school houses. School Gardens have been planned and seeds distributed.

The "Clean-Up-Week" found her hammering away on the colored women of the entire county for cleaner kitchens and back yards.

The white citizens are ever and always ready to help those deserving ones of the colored race. The meeting at the colored Baptist church of this city a few Sundays ago is an evidence of the sincere desire to aid our negro citizens. Mayor James, Dr. Laughinghouse, Prof. Meadows of E. C. T. T. School, Prof. S. B. Underwood County Industrial Supervisor and Dr. Battle delivered instructive addresses. They were all deliciously presented to a large and appreciative audience. Dr. Battle preached the Health Sermon.

Michiganers Talk Tax Reform.

Lausang, April 21.—A conference on tax reform will be heard here today for a full and free discussion of plans for relieving the general public of the growing burdens placed upon it by the present system. Not only are prominent Michigan reformers here in numbers, but many guests from out side states will aid the convention in the discussions. A sentiment was freely expressed as the conference opened that some system must soon be devised by which enterprise and industry shall not be discouraged by taxation. The attendance of prominent civic and business leaders from Detroit and other Michigan cities gives promise of a permanent organization which will work for definite methods of tax relief.

The sessions are planned for today in the Lausang Chamber of Commerce and each will be made interesting by prominent speakers on taxation questions.

The Kentucky Negro Educational Association opened its annual meeting today, with 600 members of that body present. The negro teachers are handling their own separate problems, and speakers at their meetings are some of the foremost thinkers and educators of the country who are giving attention to negro education.
