

JAPANESE LESS RESENTFUL

Wilson's Stand On Alien Land Bill Modifies Public Opinion.

Tokio, April 21.—The announcement that President Wilson and Secretary of State Bryan are making efforts to bring about a compromise in the proposed California legislation with respect to the alien land ownership bill, has softened Japanese ire, and public opinion has now become more optimistic.

The alleged unwillingness of the American missionaries to assist in resisting the bill is the subject of harsh criticism in the Japanese papers, but after a conference with Count Okuma, the Foreign Minister, the missionaries dispatched telegrams to California, the exact nature of which are not known. Count Okuma ironically reminded the missionaries that Japan owned its first lessons in foreign humanitarian principles to the United States. "Now the duty has devolved upon Japan," he added, "to teach the Californians the same principles."

The Japanese consul at Vancouver, C. Yada, who arrived here, has caused some excitement by the statements that anti-Japanese legislation is pending in the Canadian provinces of British Columbia, Saskatchewan and Manitoba.
