PUBLIC MEETING.

OCTOBER 28th, 1887. Meeting called to order by H S Nunn chairman, who stated the object of the people.

Wednesday night, reported that the aroused. committee had met at the City Hall resolutions:

Whereas, There is a lack of prosperity in Craven county and the surround-ing section of the State, which is growing day by day unto alarming proportions. manifesting itself in the curtailment of our business operations, in the deprecia-tion of the value of our property and in his farewell sermon tonight and will the emigration of our young men. And, whereas, it is believed these results are in a large measure due to the want of adequate transportation facilities, and the combinations and pools of connec ting railroads, making inefficient the only outlet we now have and practically cutting us off from all the business in tercourse with the rest of the State not

immediately adjacent to us, therefore Resolved 1. That it is the sense of this meeting that a railroad from New Berne to Wilmington through the counties of Jones, Onslow and Pender would advantage by giving us other connections and providing an additional outlet

and inlet for our commerce.

Resolved 2. That we must and we will ourselves in a position to command better rates and to defy the un friendly designs of hostile corporations Resolved 3. That it is the sense of this meeting that the county of Craven should subscribe sixty thousand dollars to the construction of a railroad from New Berne to New River in Obslow county, there to connect with a rail road about to be built from there to Wilmington, and that said county should also subscribe forty thousand dollars to a railroad to be built from New Berne to Washington, N. C., there connecting with a line of rail and water transportation (now nearly completed to Norfolk, Va., thus creating a through line of coset railway from the cities of the North via New Berne.

Resolved 4, That a committee of lif teen be appointed to wait upon the Board of Commissioners of this county at their next monthly meeting, and request that body to submit to the people the Eastern Carolina Land and Railway Company, a proposition for the said county to subscribe the said sums of sixty and forty thousand dollars to said railroads, respectively.
