THE LATEST.

PORTSMOUTH, O., June 28.—A terrible disaster occurred to-day at a place about three miles north of here. Some workmen were excavating for the purpose of laying a foundation for a pile of the South Shore Railroad bridge when the bank caved in and crushed six of the men to death.

FLEMINGSBURG, Ky., June 28.—The war in Rowan county is by no means ended. The escaped Tolliverites are now in Elliott county, their home, rapidly recruiting a large following and this week propose to retake Morehead, kill every man they can who took part in the recent killing of Craig Tolliver and three of his supporters and then burn the town. Col. Tolliver, is at the head of the movement. Col. T. and a cousin, also named Tolliver, were arrested in Elliott county Friday, on a warrant from Rowan county, and placed in jail at Martinsburg.

That night a mob of forty or fifty Tolliverites broke into jail and rescued the two prisoners. There is intense excitement again throughout Rowan county in anticipation of the proposed raid. John Rogers, one of the Tolliver men who had such a narrow escape from death at Morehead last Monday, was arrested at Mt. Sterling. He is charged with murder.

OATMEAL IN THE HOUSEHOLD.—In Great Britain children of all ranks are raised on a oatmeal diet alone, for the reason that it causes them to grow strong and healthful, and no better food can possibly be found for them. It is also quite as desirable for the student as for the laborer, and for the delicate lady and her hard working sister. Indeed, all classes would be greatly benefited by its use, and dyspepsia, with all its manifold annoyances can be kept at a distance. Oatmeal is a more substantial food, it is said, than veal, pork, or lamb, and quite equal to beef and mutton giving as much or more mental vigor, while its great desideratum consists in one's not becoming weary of it, for it is as welcome for breakfast or tea as is wheat or graham bread. It can be eaten with syrup and butter like rice. It is especially good for young mothers, upon whose nervous forces too great a demand has been made, and they lose the equilibrium of the system and become depressed and dissipated. Oatmeal requires to be cooked slowly and the water should be boiling hot when it is stirred in.
