L. King, of Greensboro, had a daughter borne to him to-day. Services to-morrow at the West Market Street Church at 11, a. m. and 8:30, p. m., conducted by the pastor, Rev. J. E. Mann. Sunday School at 9:40 Young Men's Prayer Meeting at 5, p. m. Mr. John H. Dobson, of Surry, has been nominated for the position of elector on the Democratic ticket from the Fifth Congressional District. He is a son of the late Solicitor Dobson and has the reputation of being a good stump speaker. Mr. Jerre Highfill and wife, of Summerfield, who lost a daughter, (Mrs. Patterson) went down to Liberty, as did also Will and Callie, the brother and sister, of Walnut Cove, on yesterday to attend the funeral and returned by the afternoon train. That paragraph about David Rigby, who carries the mail from Mt. Airy, which was written for, and appeared first in the Daily Workman, is having a fine run in our State exchanges, but improperly credited to the Winston Sentinel. Hunter, who was reported yester-day as one who had providentially escaped from the railroad wreck of Thursday morning is still in the city, and did not go home to day. We learn that he is quite sore about the back and shoulders, and is still weak from the severe shock. To have es-caped, when every one in the car be-side himself was killed, seems mir-aculous. In fact, his name is put down in the list of the killed as it ap-pears in the Danville Register of to-day. But there is another fact quite unaccountable—the trunks contained in the baggage car were so comple-tely demolished in the wreck that the clothing contained in them was thrown in heaps here and there; his trunk escaped with no visible dent or scratch.
