Sudden Death of Judge Settle. As might well be assumed from the nature of the case, our community was startled no little when the sudden death of JUDGE THOMAS SETTLE, which occurred in Judge Dick's room in the United States Court house, at a quarter past 12 to day, was announced on the street.

The Judge was complaining yesterday of a pain in the region of the heart, as of a neuralgic affection of that organ, although, as he passed down South Elm near dusk on his way home he was as full of life and animation as we ever saw him.

The death of JUDGE SETTLE will be widely deplored. He was able in his profession as a lawyer, and distinguished as a politician, and as a United States Judge, and as a citizen and a neighbor was pre-eminently kind, genial and obliging, and was a central figure in the social world; just such a man, in fact, as wins the kindly esteem of all, and makes a vacuum by his absence.
