Graham College.

"The Christian Sun announces" says the News and Observer, "the decision of the authorities to remove Graham College from Graham to Mill Point, five miles west of Burlington, on the N. C. R. R. The name of Mill Point will be changed to the name of the college, which is not yet determined." The above is the first authoritative information we have had of the recent action of the Provisional Board in regard to the college. We think the Board, that is those favoring the move, have committed a great folly and blundered most egregiously.
