—There are fine breaks of tobacco at the different warehouses to-day.

—Mr. J. A. Odell returned from Asheboro court, via. Millboro, this morning.

—Jay Gould and his family passed through here this morning going north in their private car.

—The trains have been delayed considerably by the wreck of the freight train near Salem Junction.

—Prayer meeting and Bible reading at the Baptist church to-night at 8 o'clock. All are cordially invited to attend.

—Mr. Jack Pryor, who has been out to Louisville, Ky., passed through here this morning on his way to his home in Fayetteville.

—Preaching at Westminister church to-night at 7:45 by Rev. S. O. Hall. All are cordially invited to attend. Services to continue throughout the week.

—The pavement from the depot toward the court house has reached as far as the store house of the Odell Hardware Company, and from that point is moving forward with as much rapidity as the circumstances will permit.
