AN ANCIENT BOOK.—We have been privileged to examine one of the oldest books now extant, its date being 1559. It appears to be a series of lectures or annotations on the Latin Grammar of Phillip Melancthon, who, it will be remembered, died in 1560, one year after the date of the book. The author of the book seems to have been John Irenens, "Ad Candidum Lectosem." The heading of the pages throughout the book is, "Annotationes in Grammaticam," and the number of pages is 758. Three hundred and thirty years is a good old age for a book, but this one is well preserved. There seems not to have been a single leaf lost. The binding is of thick oak board, with a covering of leather, and has two strong copper clasps, one of which broke off at some time, but is found inside the book. Quite a number of notes are found on the pages, but there is no clue to the time when they were made or by whom. As to the ownership of the book, there is a name on one of the fly leaves—

"Jacob D. Mitchell, Nassau Hall (now Princeton College, N. J.) 1824."

Where this book has been all this while it would be interesting to know, and when it made its way across the sea. How many stirring scenes it has passed through we can only imagine.
